Regardless of your position, you must remain respectful of other persons and property.

It is a stressful time of the year for everyone. We are each responsible for the members of our community. Let us be supportive of one another. Let us watch out for and take care of each other. If we cannot do these things within this small community that prides itself on the unifying ethos known as the St. Mary's Way, the world is much worse off than I ever imagined and St. Mary's College of Maryland is just another small school filled with average, self-centered people doing unspectacular things. We can and must do better.

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
