High School Teachers vs College Professors








K-12 Teachers

- Execute a pre-approved curriculum
- Teach background information
- Focus on classroom management
- Implement an IEP when notified by the school







Professors

- Create their own curriculum
- Assign readings or prerequisite classes to cover background information
- Establish protocols in their syllabus
- Execute college-initiated accommodations once the student provides an official letter





Teachers

- Executes a pre-approved curriculum
- Teaches background information
- Focuses on classroom management
- Implements an IE when notified by the school

- Support student learning
 - Can be reached outside of class

Professors

- Create their own curriculum
- Assigns readings or prerequisite classes to cover background information
- Establishes protocols in their syllabus
- Executes college-initiated accommodations once the student provides an official letter





High School Classroom Management

 School system determines classroom management

"Every Student Succeeds Act"

(ESSA)



College Classroom Management

Faculty Members decide:

- How to manage their classroom
- How flexible (or not) they wish to be.

College Policies:

 Violations may be referred to the Conduct system, even for students who receive accommodations.
 Students are expected to adhere to the Student Code of Conduct.





Attendance: Low impact Excused absences If a student misses class, teacher is likely to give them the material they missed.

College Attendance

- Different attendance policies for each class.
- Student responsibility for knowing policies.
- No "excused absences"; just absences
- Student can fail a course due to absenteeism.
- Different professors have different expectations for how a student gets missed content.







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High School Graduation Requirements/Schedules

Students not expected to know what classes they need to graduate.

 Schedules usually made for them by counselors.

College Graduation/Major Requirements/Schedules

- Students expected to know/ keep track of graduation/major requirements
- Students work with their advisors to plan their course sequence.





School Counselors vs Academic Advisors

High School Counselors

- Provides academic, emotional, & psychological support
- Schedule meetings with students



College Academic Advisor

- Provides academic planning and career development
- Experts in a given discipline/field of study
- Help students define goals, create an academic path
- Students usually initiate appointments

Academic Advising



- · Get help on your degree plan
- Choose a major and career
- Find support for your academic career
- Register for your courses
- · Prepare for graduation
- · Get engaged on campus
- Explore campus resources



High School Grading/Exams	College Grading/Exams
 Hard to fail classes Given endless chances to turn in work Reschedule exams Teachers work with students and parents to get student back on track 	 Can earn 0s / fail classes Student must refer to the syllabus for deadlines Limited ability to reschedule exams Student is responsible for staying on track

"FN": F due to excessive absences

"I": Incomplete

"IP": In Progress (especially for SMPs)
