

#### Kudos!

Ya Haddy Njie (SMCM 2009). Ya Haddy is the first Gambian student to enroll directly from a Gambian secondary school and graduate from SMCM (studio art major). Ya Haddy plans to work for a year in the United States before returning to The Gambia.

Yamai Secka-Jack. Yamai joined the PEACE program full-time as the resident coordinator in January, 2009. Yamai has worked part-time for the program for many years, and served as Associate Peace Corps Director in The Gambia for Education for 18 years. She made her first visit to SMCM in June, and returns to SMCM this week before heading back home to Gambia.

Femi Ojo-Ade. Professor emeritus Femi Ojo-Ade recently completed two years as the SMCM PEACE professor at the University of The Gambia. Femi will be teaching at a Nigerian University in the upcoming academic year, but intends to continue his affiliation with the University of The Gambia.

Christy Wolovich. Christy is a primatologist (U of Miami) who will be the next SMCM PEACE professor at the University of The Gambia. Christy is leading a group of 11 SMCM students to Gambia this fall, and will carry out her own research on *Galago senegalensis*, the bushbaby, a nocturnal prosimian distributed throughout Gambia.

Assan Sarr and Marion Gladys Mendy Sarr. Assan and Marion had a baby girl, Fatou Sarr, in June, 2009. Assan is finishing the full draft of his dissertation in African History at Michigan State University, while Marion is taking maternal leave from her MA in African Studies at Ohio University.

Former Dean of the School of Information Technology and Communications at the American University of Nigeria, he is eager to expand collaboration in the areas of faculty exchange, professional development, and service with St. Mary's College of Maryland.

Pierre Gomez. Dr. Gomez is the academic liaison for the SMCM/UTG PEACE program. He presented his paper last March, *Prospects for PEACE at the University of The Gambia*, at the 69<sup>th</sup> annual meeting of the Society for Applied Anthropology in Santa Fe, New Mexico. 2009 Spring Service-Learning student cohort. Eleven SMCM students returned to the United States the end of May after a semester in The Gambia. You'll hear more from these students during the upcoming fall semester.

#### **Current Activities**

Eleven SMCM students leave August 25 for the Fall 2009 Signature Semester in The Gambia. The fall semester cohort, led by PEACE professor Christy Wolovich, will likely be the first SMCM group since the 2008 Nitze group to visit Niokolo Koba National Park in eastern Senegal. SMCM/UTG courses offered this fall include Introductory Wolof, Ecology and Conservation, Animal Behavior, Environmental Management and Introduction to African Literature.

Peace Corps Gambia volunteers have offered to host SMCM students for weekend home stays during the fall semester. Peace Corps Gambia volunteers and staff would like the SMCM community to join them and raise money for insecticide treated bed nets that will be given to poor Gambian families before the 2010 rainy season. Malaria is a major cause of morbidity and under-five mortality in The Gambia. She will also visit the department responsible for maps and the personal archives of the great oral historian Bakary Sidibeh, who is the cultural coordinator for the PEACE program and founder of the Gambia National Museum.

UTG students who have studied at SMCM or Payap University are forming a PEACE alumni association at the University of The Gambia.
