Benefits of Global Experiences | Students who study, intern, volunteer, or work abroad discover that stepping outside of their cultures and immersing themselves in another country's cultures influences their careers, increases their self-confidence, enhances their intercultural understanding and engagement, and builds lifelong friendships.

Ignite Your Education / Academic Benefits | After studying or interning abroad, most students view their educational interests, as well as the privileges of learning, through a very different lens. Studying abroad often leads to new academic interests, an even stronger dedication to academic studies, and a reinforced commitment to world language study. Students often return as strong advocates for increased access to learning beyond the classroom for all students. Studying abroad also gives you a competitive edge when applying to graduate school programs.

Launch Your Career / Professional Benefits | Your experiences abroad can greatly influence the career path you choose. Including global experiences like study or intern abroad programs on your résumé can enhance your employability across a wide range of professional sectors — even in careers that are not obviously "global" (i.e., elementary school teacher or veterinarian). More and more employers seek candidates who have successfully navigated new and diverse communities, are knowledgeable of current events around the world, and can work effectively in an increasingly interconnected global workplace.

Not only are internships abroad an ideal way to experience local culture in the workplace and improve foreign language skills, but they provide unique experiences that can strengthen your résumé, making you more marketable in the eyes of employers, both in the United States and abroad. Having a study abroad or internship experience gives you an advantage over your peers who do not have comparable overseas experiences.

Become a Global Citizen / Personal Benefits | Students who have studied abroad often cite their personal growth — like increased global awareness and the ability to think and live as a global citizen — as one of the most important and life-changing outcomes of their experience abroad. The opportunity to better understand your cultural values and beliefs in a new context is truly invaluable.

Financial Support

Studying abroad can be affordable! Alumni survey by IES Abroad showed that 60% of students receive aid to study abroad. Regardless of whom you study with, take advantage of all these forms of aid for study abroad:

Federal & State Aid

All federal aid can be used for study abroad (it's the law!). Depending on where you live and go to school, state and institutional financial aid can be used. Contact your financial aid office or study abroad office to find out more.

Scholarships & Grants

Millions of dollars in aid are available for study abroad. Visit <u>DiversityAbroad.com</u> for a complete directory of scholarships (diversity-related scholarships are particularly highlighted) and speak to your study abroad office to discuss further funding opportunities (ex. institutional awards).

Personal Fundraising

Another way to help finance your study abroad experience is through personal fundraising. Not only is it a way for you to earn money, it also gets your friends and family involved in your study abroad plans.

Crowd-Source Funding

Crowdfunding is a creative way to use your network to raise money for your experience abroad. These online platforms, like KickStarter, allow you to create fundraising campaigns to tell your story and use social media tools to promote your fundraising campaign to family, friends, and other people in your network.

Study Abroad Loans

After you've exhausted other ways of financing your study abroad, student loans are a great way to cover additional costs. While scholarships and grants are gifts, study abroad loans must be repaid with interest. Loans shouldn't be your first means for financing study abroad but should be an option. Remember, just like your education at your home school is an investment, your study abroad experience is an investment in your future with many benefits.



Perceptions Abroad

Regardless of race, religion, gender, physical disability, or sexual orientation, there is a possibility that you will encounter discrimination abroad, just as you may face discrimination on your home campus or in your hometown. However, most underrepresented students report having positive experiences abroad and say people are interested in them and their culture because they are different from the American image often portrayed in the media. Don't let the possibility of discrimination stop you from experiencing the lifelong benefits of going abroad.



Questions You Should Ask Before Going Abroad

- What universal or local stereotypes exist that could affect how my ethnic group, race, or other aspect of my identity may be perceived in my host country?
- What are my preconceived notions about the people in my host country? Are they valid? How can I challenge those thoughts?
- How should I react if I find something to be offensive?
- If someone asks something I perceive as insensitive, does that mean they have bad intentions or are they just curious and inquiring in a way that may be okay in their culture?

- What can I do to influence the way people of my ethnicity are perceived in my host country?
- How will my being a member of a majority or minority group in my home country influence my experience abroad?
- Does my program have support staff who will understand and help me through any racial or discriminatory incident I may face?
- Do I have any friends or peers at my school who I can talk to about diversity abroad who also share my background and have already studied abroad?
- Are there any students from my host country at my campus who I can talk to?

Take Your Next Steps to Study Abroad

- **1. Talk with your academic advisor.** Discuss your academic goals and graduation requirements with your advisor to ensure that you can successfully fit study abroad into your academic plan.
- **2. Visit your study abroad office.** Meet with your oncampus study abroad advisor to find the right program for you—one that fits your academic, personal, and career goals.



3. Research and select your program. Select the location, program, and time you want to go abroad. Inquire about the diversity-related support on-site and what types of scholarships are available. Make sure you feel comfortable with the student services provided and that safety and crisis management are high priorities for the program provider.

4. Research funding opportunities.

Visit <u>DiversityAbroad.com</u>, as well as your study abroad office, for information about the many diversity, merit-, and need-based scholarships available for study abroad.

5. Research Health & Safety Protocols.

Ensure that you are aware of what actions need to be taken to ensure that your health and safety is supported in the host country. Check out the US Department of State website for special considerations for different identities, vaccination requirements and/or evacuation policies for the country you are interested in visiting.

6. Apply for your passport. Make sure you apply for your passport as soon as possible. Passport processing is taking longer than usual due to recent changes in regulations.

7. Contact your financial aid office.

Verify whether all of your financial aid will support your study abroad experience. All federal aid can be used for study abroad. Depending on where you live and go to school, state and institutional financial aid can be used, but some schools place limits on what campus scholarships will cover.

- 7. Plan your budget. Use the estimated fees and student expenses that program providers offer to determine in advance how to maximize your budget abroad. In addition to program cost, you must think about your lifestyle and what other fees you may incur abroad (e.g., traveling, souvenirs, dining). These estimates will help you anticipate the cost of living while you are abroad. Visit IESabroad.org/study-abroad/financing-study-abroad for budget ideas and money saving tips.
- **8. Prepare for an adventure.** Get ready for a life-changing experience with study abroad.
