Institutional Identity

Character and purpose: A public honors college, St. Mary's College of Maryland seeks to provide an excellent undergraduate liberal arts education and small-college experience of the sort more commonly associated with outstanding private institutions: a faculty of gifted teachers and distinguished scholars, a talented and diverse student body, high academic standards, a challenging curriculum rooted in the traditional liberal arts, small classes, many opportunities for intellectual enrichment, and a spirit of community.

This focus gives St. Mary's a distinctive identity within Maryland's higher education system and thus offers the people of Maryland an important alternative. Small, intellectually rigorous liberal arts colleges have always made vital contributions to American society, producing a disproportionate number of the nation's leaders in the professions, in science, in public affairs, and in business. These colleges stress education rather than training, the development of mental skills and abilities, and intellectual breadth in the arts, humanities, natural, and social sciences. By fostering close faculty-student interaction--a function of their small size--such colleges steep their students in the process of intellectual, social, and personal exploration. St. Mary's is the most residential of the state's colleges and universities, a fact that enhances its success in forging a close-knit academic community.

As a public college, St. Mary's offers families throughout Maryland an affordable alternative to much more expensive private institutions offering a similar education. Moreover, the College sees its distinctive mission among liberal arts colleges as the provision of the opportunity for students from a broad socioeconomic, ethnic, and racial spectrum to acquire the kind of education that will enable them to assume leadership roles in their chosen fields and in civic matters. The St. Mary's alternative makes possible a diverse, heterogeneous student body that can foster the most fruitful kinds of intellectual and personal interchanges and the most exciting of educational communities.

Given its designation as an honors college, St. Mary's carries the obligation to offer its students an educational experience that goes beyond traditional course-based study and, rather, fosters independent learning and the forging of links between curricular, co-curricular, and extra-curricular interests and activities. Because it is a public honors college, St. Mary's hopes to instill in its students a sense of civic responsibility, emphasizing notions of community and encouraging cooperative or collaborative endeavors in both academic and extra-curricular life.


- * The administrative organization chart has been redesigned for clarity (p. 59).




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FACTS IN BRIEF

St. Mary's College of Maryland is a four-year, state-supported, liberal arts college which offers the Bachelor of Arts degree in 21 disciplines: Anthropology / Sociology, Art, Biology, Chemistry, Computer Science, Dramatic Arts, Economics, English, Foreign Language, History, Human Development, Independent Student-designed Major, Mathematics, Music, Natural Science, Philosophy, Physics, Political Science, Psychology, Public Policy, and Religion. → Religious Studies.

Total enrollment for the Fall, 1997, semester was 1682 students (including SMCM students studying abroad or on other U.S. campuses), with an FTE of 1687. Eighty-nine percent of the student body studying on campus are full-time students, and 73% of these full-time students live on campus.

In 1997, 350 students were awarded a baccalaureate degree with 41 of these students having double majors. Biology had the greatest number of graduates (68 grads) followed by Psychology (54 grads) and Economics (40 grads).

During the fall of 1997, the College employed 99 regular full-time faculty (non-"Visiting", Assistant through Full Professor), 14 full-time "Visiting" faculty, 2 full-time non-visiting Instructors, and 52 part-time faculty. Approximately 97% (96 out of 99) of all regular full-time faculty hold doctoral or other terminal academic degrees. Since the 1982-83 academic year, St. Mary's College has had 13 Fulbright Scholars among the faculty.

St. Mary's occupies 34 buildings on a 275-acre campus on the St. Mary's River. The College's facilities include a 164,182 volume library, a multi-purpose fine arts center, a community center, an Olympic-qualifying swimming pool, an outdoor track, six tennis courts, two gymnasiums, a variety of sailboats and other water craft, and a riverfront boathouse and dock.

St. Mary's College is accredited by the Middle States Association of Colleges and Schools with additional accreditation by the National Association of Schools of Music. The Carnegie Foundation Classification Code for the College is "Baccalaureate (Liberal Arts) College I." SMCM was awarded a Phi Beta Kappa chapter in the fall of 1997.

For 1996-97, the College had a total revenue of \$29.9 million. The State of Maryland provides an annual appropriation of approximately \$12 million. A copy of an independent auditor's report concerning the finances of the College is available in the Office of the Comptroller.

For the fiscal year ending in 1997, the total endowment funds for the College were \$12,469,221 (College Foundation Endowment = \$8,383,157 and the College Endowment = \$4,086,064).

**SIGNIFICANT EVENTS IN THE HISTORY OF
ST. MARY'S COLLEGE OF MARYLAND***

- 21 MAR 1840 Gov. William Grason signs into law the "Act to Authorize the Drawing of a Lottery to Establish a Female Seminary ... on the Site of the Ancient City of Saint Marys" (Legislative Session of 1839, Chapter 190).
- MAY 1846 The first students begin classes at the Seminary.
- 1847 - 1848 The first full academic year is conducted at the Seminary.
- JUN 1874 St. Mary's Female Seminary issues its first "Certificate of Graduation" (diploma) to Miss Sallie Brome Morsell.
- 5 JAN 1924 Fire guts the old Seminary building of 1844-45 (the first Calvert Hall).
- 23 APR 1926 St. Mary's becomes the first junior college in Maryland upon recommendation of the Board of Trustees.
- 11 JUN 1929 Edwin Tyler Burch becomes the first male to graduate from St. Mary's Female Seminary.
- 12 JUN 1930 Katherine M. Bowdle, Dorothy Connor, Irma K. Mumford, and Virginia Dare Sollers become the first graduates of the Junior College Division.
- 10 JUN 1935 Charles Birch becomes the first male graduate of the Junior College.
- MAY 1937 Adele Prance is named the first president of St. Mary's Female Seminary - Junior College and the school is included as a regular item in the state budget for the first time.
- 1937-1938 St. Mary's becomes a four year Junior College (high school grades 11 and 12, college years 1 and 2).
- 1 JUL 1948 Dr. Anna May Russell becomes the new president of St. Mary's Female Seminary Junior College.
- 1 JUL 1949 "Female" is dropped from the name of the institution.
- 5 JUN 1960 St. Mary's graduates its last high school class.
- APR 1964 Gov. Tawes signs legislation changing the name of the institution to the present St. Mary's College of Maryland.
- SEP 1965 The first resident male students arrive on campus.
- 28 SEP 1966 The State Board of Higher Education approves the elevation of St. Mary's to senior college status, and the school initiates a baccalaureate curriculum beginning in the 1967-68 academic year.
- 8 JUN 1968 The last Junior College class graduates from St. Mary's.
- 1 JUL 1969 Dr. J. Renwick Jackson appointed President.
- 29 MAY 1971 St. Mary's College of Maryland awards its first baccalaureate degrees.
- 6 FEB 1982 Dr. Richard D. Weigle appointed Interim President.
- 1 JUL 1983 Dr. Edward T. Lewis appointed President.
- 5 OCT 1991 Designated "A Public Honors College" by William Donald Schaefer, Governor of Maryland
- 12 MAY 1992 Bill to reorganize working relationship between the State and SMC signed by Governor Schaefer.
- 1 JUL 1996 Dr. Jane Margaret O'Brien appointed President.
- 27 SEP 1997 College awarded a Phi Beta Kappa chapter.





Percentile Rank of SAT Scores by Freshman Class





RETENTION of FIRST-TIME FULL-TIME FRESHMEN



The Women's Sailing Team, also competing in the ICYRA, finished as follows: 8th (1990), 3rd (1991), 3rd (1992), 3rd (1993), and 2nd (1994). National finishes achieved in Team Racing were: 5th (1992), 5th (1993), 3rd (1994), and 4th (1996). Additional national finishes achieved were: 3rd (1986) in the Singlehanded National Championships, 1st (1993) in the Sloop National Championships, 8th (1994) in the Men's ICYRA Singlehandeds, 1st (1994) in the Women's ICYRA National Singlehandeds Championships, and 1st (1995) in the Women's National Dinghy Championships. St. Mary's was the site of the 1993 National Sailing Championships in Dinghy and Women's events and the 1995 site for the National Coed Singlehandeds.

SOCER: The women's soccer team was ranked 5th in the South Atlantic Region at the end of 1990-91 and 6th at the beginning of the 1991-92 season.

SWIMMING: The women's swimming team was Chesapeake Collegiate Athletic Conference Champions in 1990.



ANNUAL TUITION: IN- and OUT-OF-STATE CHARGES





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Excerpts from the Mission Statement, cont.

Functional emphasis: St. Mary's stresses teaching and seeks above all to foster excellence in instruction. In recruiting a new faculty member, the College has as its foremost concern the candidate's ability to provide excellent instruction. As faculty members are considered for promotion and continued appointment, the quality of teaching, as identified in student evaluations and peer review, is a critical element in the evaluation. Although research is a lesser priority, the College believes that excellent teaching is enriched by the knowledge and skills developed in research and other professional activities. Encouraged by the College, an increasing number of faculty have been successful in involving students in collaborative research endeavors that enable these students to become active learners. The College strives to be a good citizen by providing educational and cultural resources for the people of Southern Maryland and by encouraging faculty members to be active in the wider community. Public concerts and lectures, as well as the involvement of individual faculty members in community activities, are reflective of the institution's role in the region.

Degree levels: The College is devoted exclusively to a liberal arts education at the undergraduate level, leading to the degree of Bachelor of Arts.

Carnegie classification: St. Mary's is classified as a Liberal Arts College I.

Instructional Program Emphasis

The St. Mary's curriculum is designed to prepare students for future success in work and in life through the development of their abilities in communication, critical analysis, and creative thinking. The College curriculum stresses intellectual breadth through rigorous requirements in the arts, humanities, natural sciences, and social sciences. At St. Mary's all students must complete an unusually large set of common requirements.

In addition, St. Mary's requires students to gain depth in a particular field by choosing an academic major. At St. Mary's, major programs are focused on the traditional liberal arts disciplines and a few inter-disciplinary programs. The College also offers students the opportunity to develop their own majors, under close faculty supervision, via the "Independent Student-designed Major."

[The operating goals of the college] ...are directed toward enhancing the distinctive mission of St. Mary's--the provision of a rigorous, intellectually stimulating, and ethically challenging college experience that provides a solid foundation of essential knowledge and skills, challenges students to set goals and take initiatives, and engenders a sense of civic responsibility. Few liberal arts colleges in the United States still provide upward mobility in leadership roles for all sectors of society, and none in Maryland focuses so firmly on educating, within the State, future professional and civic leaders.
