Tip #3 – Be Open To Other Disciplines

- Fee collection
- Administration
- Maintenance

 EVERY National Park Service job is equally important to the overall success of our organization.

Tip #4 – Be Open to Different Parks

- Natural vs. historical
- Urban vs. rural
- Large parks vs. small parks

Go where no one else wants to go!

Tip #5 – Diversify Your Skills

The broader your skill set, the more competitive you'll be for positions down the road.

 Experience in multiple park divisions/disciplines

Also beneficial because of.....

Tip #6 – Balancing Work and Family

The broader your skill set, the more options you have when balancing work and family priorities.

Tip #7 – Go Above and Beyond

 Don't be afraid to work outside your position description

 Do what it takes to distinguish yourself from the crowd

Keep a positive attitude!

Tip #8 – Going backward to go forward

- Sometimes you need to take a step backward (or sideways) to get where you want to go.
 - It's okay to take a downgrade it might be the best path in the long run.

 Especially applies to getting your first permanent position.

Tip #9 – Consider a Cover Letter

 Not all hiring officials want them (or read them)

 Make sure it's specific to the park and job you're applying for

Tip #10 – Be Persistent

 Getting permanent can be a short road, or a long road.

If it's a long road...make the most of it!

Seasonal jobs are a chance to try new places, new types of parks, and to find whether NPS is the right fit for you.

Tip #11 – Consider Other Agencies

- Get permanent status with another federal agency, and then apply to permanent jobs (merit promotion) with the National Park Service.
- May not need this strategy if you qualify under the Land Management Workforce Flexibility Act (LMWFA).
- Be aware of the risks!

Tip #12 – There Are Multiple Paths

There is no set formula for a National Park
 Service career

Choose your own adventure! Find the path that works for you!

Talk to lots of people, get a variety of perspectives – and feel free to disregard advice!

Tip #13 – Find A Mentor(s)

Can be a formal or informal mentor
