St. Mary's College of Maryland Policy Regarding Student Criminal History Information (Pending Board of Trustee approval 7.19.19)

The College makes every effort to maintain a learning and living environment that is safe and free of potential threats of harm to our community. The College also seeks to support students with a criminal background, so as to provide those students with the opportunity to obtain the knowledge and skills needed to contribute positively to society.

Academic Enrollment

A criminal history does not automatically disqualify an applicant from admission into the College. Where, however, the College learns that an applicant or admitted student has a criminal history (i.e., an arrest or criminal conviction), the College shall consider the following in making its decision to deny, limit, or revoke admission to the College.

- 1. The age of the student at the time any aspect of the student's criminal history occurred;
- 2. The time that has elapsed since any aspect of the student's criminal history occurred;
- 3. The nature of the criminal history; and
- 4. Any evidence of rehabilitation or good conduct produced by the student.

Campus Residency

:

As safety will always be the College's top priority, where the College learns that an applicant or admitted student has a criminal history which the College believes poses a risk of harm to our community, the College may elect to deny, rescind, or limit a student's access to campus residency. As with academic enrollment decisions, the College shall consider the following in making its decision to deny or limit campus residency:

- 1. The age of the student at the time any aspect of the student's criminal history occurred;
- 2. The time that has elapsed since any aspect of the student's criminal history occurred;
- 3. The nature of the criminal history; and
- 4. Any evidence of rehabilitation or good conduct produced by the student.

Support

The College may also offer supportive counseling or services to help rehabilitate and educate a student with a criminal record on the barriers posed by having such a record. At the College's <u>Wellness Center</u>, confidential counseling is offered by our licensed mental health professionals, for all admitted students. The Center's multi-disciplinary team of

clinicians works collaboratively to optimize student wellness through seamless prevention and intervention.
